Safe & Secure



Collected 1,206 lbs of medications in 2018 for a total of 3,253 lbs since the program started in 2015s.

Replacement of Fire Engine 4 to meet the needs of the community on the City's North side



Full utilization of the new Fire station #3 and Police sub-station which serves the southern portion of the City



Replacement of Firefighter self-contained breathing apparatus which allows firefighters to work easier and longer in hazardous environments



Hired 4 additional Community Service Officers who help to increase Police visibility in the community.

Switched from contracted security at the Transit Center to hired security guards which has improved safety



Relocated four polling locations out of schools to provide for better handicap accessibility along with increased safety and security



Introduced online security awareness training for all employees to reduce our cyber security risk



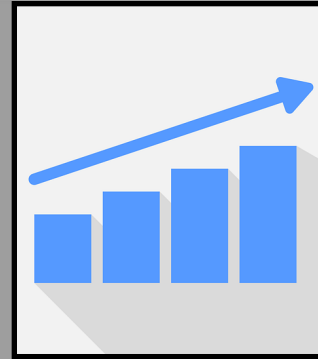

Received the Government Finance Officers Association Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting



Parks, Recreation and Forestry Department received reaccreditation. There are only 169 accredited Parks Departments in the nation.



Implementation of Employee Performance Review System which will lead to a Pay for Performance Plan



Record sales of new endowments at Prairie Home Cemetery



Completed an updated Strategic Plan for the City



City had a 9% increase in employee participation at the Health & Wellness center which saves the City on insurance costs



Utilized new ballot marker during in-person absentee voting which helped keep the costs of ballots down and reduced time on Election Day processing ballots



Received authorization to move forward in WIFIA process which will provide low-cost federal loans for the water project and help ensure the lowest possible costs for ratepayers



Customer Focused



Rolled out online permitting for electric, plumbing and HVAC permits. Contractors can now apply online for these permits and schedule inspections online



Completed Library Strategic Plan. Goals: redesigned first floor with meeting space, focus on needs of diverse community, and expanded awareness of programs



Hired a Community Library Liaison who works at the School District and Library. This has led to improved communication between the School District and Library

Created a redevelopment tax incremental finance district along White Rock Ave. to encourage reinvestment in the White Rock Corridor


FACADE, SIGN & AWNING GRANTS

Provided facade, sign and awning grants to 11 small businesses that catalyzed \$81,721 in building improvements downtown



Signed the Mayor's Monarch Pledge and committed to create habitat for the Monarch butterfly and pollinators




Forestry Department continues fight against Emerald Ash Borer


79% of the City's 4,920 Ash trees are protected from Emerald Ash Borer through treatment



Continued planning and permitting for transition to Lake Michigan water by 2023



Collected 5,424 tons of leaves that were processed into compost and put out for public use



Completed design and bid of the Greenmeadow Interceptor Sewer Project which includes installation of a new gravity sewer and allows for the elimination of two pump stations.

Completed design and construction of Phase 1 of the Area 5 Flood Mitigation improvements to mitigate the flooding in the area near Waukesha Memorial Hospital

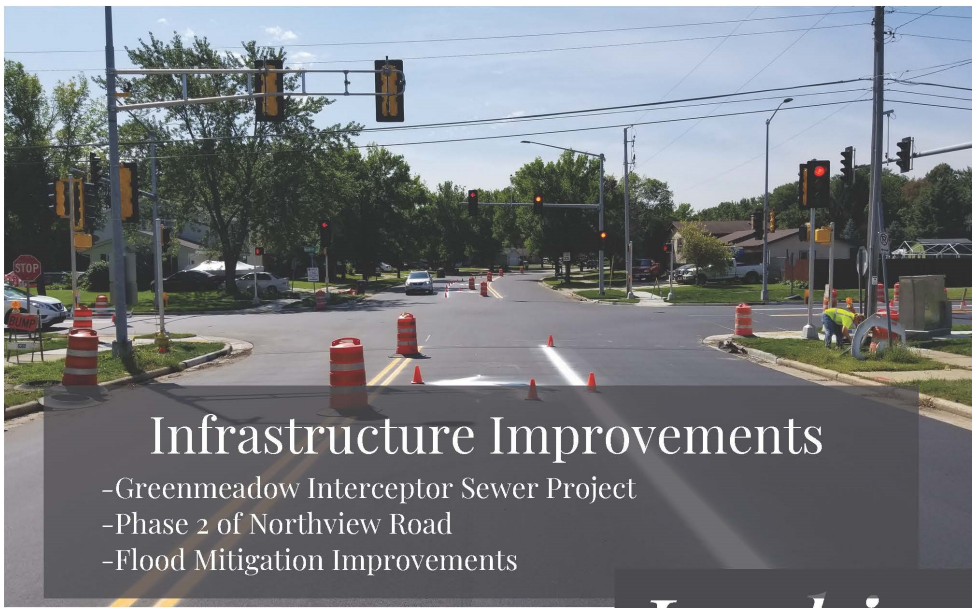




Vibrant Neighborhoods and Business Areas

Finished a city wide housing study that looked at housing needs and provides suggestions on how to increase available housing of all types to match our population growth and future workforce needs

Completed design and construction of the 5th Phase of Downtown Street and Utility Improvements with the construction of South Street from N. Grand Ave to Barstow Street and Gaspar Street from South Street to W. Main Street. This \$1.4 million project included rehab of the sanitary sewer system, relay of the water main, reconstruction of the roadway and installation of decorative brick pavers

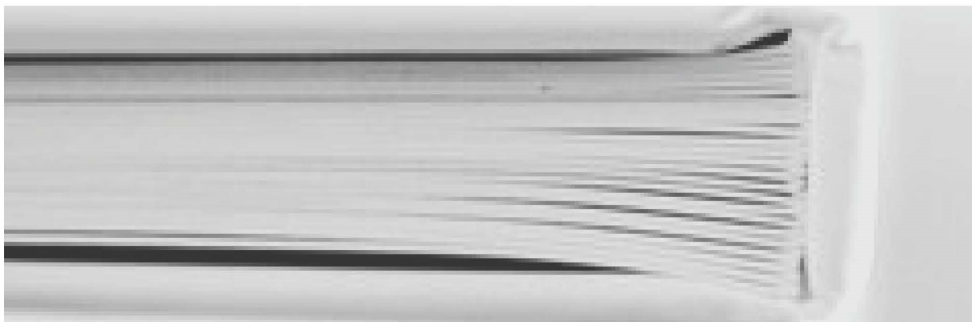
New City Hall
