10. Provide a brief description of your experience in managing a similar project. The City of Waukesha Parks, Recreation and Forestry Department's (WPRF) mission is to be responsive and committed in providing essential park, recreation and urban forestry services, making our community a desirable place to live, work and play. WPRF has years of experience as it relates to Community Development Block Grants with a wide variety of programs supported in part by these funds, such as neighborhood playground programs, adaptive recreation programs and senior/older adult programs. Over the past 20 + years, varied programs have been offered as part of our Adaptive Recreation Programs, including Summer Camp programs, special family evening events (including respite), community outings for adults with special needs, interpretive services for all ages and more. Both WPRF staff directly lead some of the adaptive programs and we currently partner with Broadscope to provide programs for the R & R Club (Respite and Recreation) and other community agencies. We are continuing to ask for allocations to support additional training for our before and after-school program personal for students with special needs. The before and after school program has been in operation for 10 years and continues to grow each year with the number of schools we serve, seven in 2018. Additionally, two of the WPRF before and after school sites are Department of Public Instruction 21st Century Community Learning Center sites which are held accountable to show increased academic achievement and social emotional growth in participants. The WPRF Recreation Programmer, Gala Siegel, who supervises these programs, has over 20 years' experience working in education and youth programming and the Recreation Services Manager, Mary Berg, has over 20 years' experience working in recreation programs and youth programming.

11. Describe the role specific staff will have in this project. Who will be responsible for managing the project, reporting to Community Development, preparing invoices, etc.?

Recreation Programmer, Gala Siegel will directly supervise the implementation and management of the project. This includes providing training and supervising staff, gathering and collecting data for outcomes and ensuring that all aspects of the program come to fruition. Recreation Services Manager, Mary Berg, will provide ongoing

support to the Recreation Programmer, Gala Siegel.

12. Provide a concise description of the proposed project.

The recreation programs are coordinated a the Schuetze Recreation Center, School District of Waukesha Elementary Schools, Banting, Bethesda, Hawthorne, Heyer, Lowell, Prairie, Randall and Rose Glen. Three specific programs are provided to youth/adults with disabilities.

- 1. Respite for Caregivers
- 2. Inclusion Services / Recreation Services
- 3. Professional Development/Staff Training
- a) WPRF collaborates with Broadscope Disability Services (previously named United Cerebral Palsy of SE Wisconsin) to provide the Respite and Recreation for the R & R Club. R & R Club (Respite and Recreation) is provided six Friday evenings during the school year at the Schuetze Recreation Center as a partnership with Broadcope Disability Services. Youth ages 0-18 years can attend the three hours of recreation activities provided by Boardcope staff and volunteers. Participants parents/ or guardians are encouraged to utilize the respite time however best fits their needs. These Friday nights are highly utilized as a social time for the youth and a respite time for families.
- B) Inclusion Services are provided to youth, adults and older adults who request these services to participate in WPRF programs. An example of this service is a young boy who is hearing impaired, joined the WPRF baseball league and needs a sign language interpreter to participate in the program. Another example is an older adult who is deaf, needs a sign language interpreter to participate in several senior social groups at the Schuetze Recreation Center. WPRF promotes inclusion in all our recreation programs and we have experienced an increase in request for inclusion/ accessibility services.
- c) Continual training for program staff is needed in order to increase successful inclusion in recreation and before and after school programs. WPRF will continue to collaborate with CESA 1, Bee Awesome Yoga and other agencies, to provide additional training for staff members working in recreation and before and after school programs.

Additional specialized training will also be provided to WPRF recreation and before /after school program staff to better support individual student need, as children enroll in programs. Our goal is for all children to be safe and successful in our recreation and before/after school programs. Over the past 10 years we have seen an increase of students in our program with special needs and more specifically behavioral disorders. With 15% of our students receiving special education services during the school day and many students requiring accommodations with undiagnosed need and behavioral issues, we must provide relevant professional development to our team. Continuous support and training is needed in order to provide inclusion in our programs. Trainings that have been identified include; ADHD, Autism Spectrum, Anxiety, Post Traumatic Stress Disorder in Youth, Diabetes Training and other training as needed throughout the school year.

17. Describe the need filled for your program or project.

The Waukesha Parks, Recreation and Forestry Department is committed to providing comprehensive and inclusive recreation programs to people of all abilities. Special accommodations are needed at times for these programs. The CDBG funding assists with additional services and trainings for these programs. The need for additional specialized training for WPRF staff is great. Our number one goal is to have all students in the program safety and successful. Since the program began nine years ago, the number of students with special needs and behavioral disorders has increased drastically. Between seven sites and an enrollment of over 600 students, we currently have approximately 15% of students with identified special needs, at some sites the number is even greater. This does not include students that have not been identified with special needs or families that choose not to disclose the diagnosis. While staff are trained in behavior management, CPR/AED, youth development, program activities and fostering healthy relationship, we have seen and increased need for specialized training and support topics such as Autism Inclusion, Nuts and Bolts of IEP's, Positive Behavior Intervention Systems, Social Emotional Regulations, Autism Consultative Coaching and more. To meet the needs of as many youth in our community and provide students a place to be safe and successful we must provide specialized training to our staff.

- **18.** Describe two anticipated measurable outcomes for your proposed project and activities.
 - 1. 180 youth with disability (birth to 21 years) will enroll in recreation/social activities during the Waukesha Respite and Recreation Club, six Friday evenings in 2019, as measured through program enrollments.
 - 2. Students with disability and behavior disorders (4-12 years) will safely, successfully and inclusively participate in the WPRF recreation and before and after school programs at Bethesda, Banting, Hawthorne, Heyer, Lowell, Prairie, Randall and Rose Glen Elementary Schools, as measured through parent surveys.
 - 3. 90% of before/afterschool staff will report an improvement of behavioral management skills because of additional Professional Development in the area of inclusive programming and challenging behaviors, as measured through our professional development staff surveys.
