Speakers, book discussion groups part of annual community read

The novel tells the story of a Japanese American family mother, daughter, and son forcibly relocated to internment camps during World War II, and their experiences there. It's an unsentimental and rich study of the family's terrible experiences.

Of course, this year's events will be different than ever before. Because of the pandemic, this will be the first ever socially distant Waukesha Reads. Library staff have worked hard to present creative and safe pro-

On Tuesday, Oct. 6, at 7 p.m. the library is hosting a YouTube event with Sam Mihara, one of 120,000 Japanese American citizens imprisoned at the Heart Mountain Relocation Center during World War II. Mr. Mihara will share his experiences at the internment

> At the end of the month, on Thursday, Oct. 29, the library is excited to have the novel's author, Julie Otsuka, on a live YouTube event at 7 p.m. "When the Emperor was Divine" is her first novel, published in 2002.

> Other events include a presentation on the Honor Flight program; a chance to learn about the Japanese tea ceremony; a "how to' program on creating oral family histories; and the popular Waukesha Reads Cabaret, featuring songs from the 1940s. All events will be streamed live on YouTube.
